

# Annual Report 2024

#### **Purpose**

To be the voice of Australia's youth.

#### Vision

To shape the Australian sound through the creation and presentation of exceptional work for young people, giving voice to contemporary Australia in all its diversity. As the premiere home for the nation's young singers, Gondwana Choirs occupies a unique space in the Australian arts ecology.

#### **Review of operations**

Gondwana Choirs has always had the ability to refine, renew and reinvent. During 2024, the organisation keenly felt the impact of cost-of-living pressures on discretionary family spending, more limited donor support, significant increases in production, performance and travel expenses, as well as the lingering effects of the global pandemic. Despite this, we were able to produce a full year of artistic activity across all our training and performance programs.

In August, our Patron Her Excellency the Honourable Margaret Beazley AC KC, Governor of New South Wales, honoured us with an evening at Government House to celebrate 35 years since Artistic Director Lyn Williams AM founded the organisation. A highlight of the event was the bestowing of three Lifetime Memberships to people whose dedication to Gondwana over decades richly deserved this recognition.

The APRA AMCOS Richard Gill Award for Distinguished Services to Australian Music was presented to Lyn Williams AM "in recognition of her decades-long commitment to the development of Australian choral music through Gondwana Choirs, and the musical voices she has amplified throughout her career."

Kim Williams, Chair of the ABC, invited Lyn Williams to deliver the final Boyer Lecture for 2024. Titled Lyn Williams: The Artistry of Children, Lyn spoke about the profound impact of choral singing on young Australians, the unique pathways it provides for musicians and the importance of making choral opportunities accessible to all, ensuring that every child has the chance to experience the transformative power of music.

Major 2024 activities of Gondwana Choirs' four main areas of activity are detailed below.

#### Gondwana National Choirs

Gondwana National Choral School returned to the University of Sydney's Women's College for the second consecutive year, with the 10-day residential program home to four choirs taking part in an intensive program of rehearsals and workshops. The program culminated with two performances by our 200-strong group of choristers: *Choral Kaleidoscope*, and *Rising Up* featuring the music of Felix Riebl.

Gondwana Voices toured to the UK, France, and Spain in a highly successful season, firstly joining Marliya for their *Spinifex Gum* show in London, before travelling to Paris and on to Spain, where a highlight of this tour was the opportunity to sing at Montserrat.

Members of Gondwana National Choirs also performed as part of a massed choir that Gondwana facilitated for performances with The Cat Empire and the Sydney Symphony Orchestra. These choristers joined Sydney Children's Choir members and hundreds of other young singers from across NSW for three September shows to sold-out audiences at the Sydney Opera House, providing more highlights in another busy performance year.

#### Marliya

Marliya opened their year with a stunning performance at Sydney Festival's *Vigil: the Future* in a unique collaboration with Stephen Page and Jake Nash. With the event featuring Marliya singing existing *Spinifex Gum* songs along with a newly commissioned piece, Stephen Page wrote: "I was in the presence of a great group of young strong women... who are so special and extraordinary story tellers."

In the middle of the year, Marliya travelled to Hobart to perform *Spinifex Gum* to an enthralled audience at Festival of Voices.

Performing *Spinifex Gum* at London's Barbican Hall to a standing ovation was a clear highlight of the Marliya journey to date. In addition to teaching the massed choir of 150 the choreography to the songs they were involved in, Marliya members shared background with young people from Gondwana Voices, Farnham Youth Choir and Royal Scottish National Orchestra Youth Chorus about the themes of incarceration, deaths in custody and the stolen generation.

#### Sydney Children's Choir

SCC participation rates remained a challenge and a focus throughout 2024. The particular age group who didn't start singing during the pandemic meant that a significant gap in the formerly stable pipeline was further exposed. Our incredible artistic staff continued to evolve our unique and holistic choral program, and we are confident that our offerings remain second to none.

Our senior choristers (including singers with changed or changing voices from our newly-named Matthew Doyle Choir) enjoyed a wonderful artistic experience at Bundanon, working with Dharawal linguist Dr Jodi Edwards and composer Sam Weiss in residence.

In other 2024 highlights, SCC took part in the Sydney Symphony's orchestral presentation of *Harry Potter and the Prisoner of Azkaban*, collaborated with Cantabile: Youth Singers of Silicon Valley, had a workshop with Daniel Hyde, Music Director of the choir of Kings College Cambridge, our Junior Performing Choir toured regional NSW and all performing choirs presented a full concert in a festival at St James Church in honour of their new organ. As noted above in the Gondwana National Choirs section, in a highly rewarding undertaking we formed the massed choir which performed in three concerts with The Cat Empire and Sydney Symphony Orchestra at the Sydney Opera House, by facilitating the joining together of SCC, Gondwana National Choirs members and hundreds of young singers from across NSW.

Voices of Angels, SCC's traditional end-of-year celebratory performance, performed to an almost sold-out audience at the Sydney Opera House Concert Hall, with an alumni choir and members of Gondwana National Choirs taking part in this triumphant close to the year.

#### Gondwana Indigenous Children's Choir

GICC's annual camp in March provided much meaningful cultural connection with our long-time collaborator, the late Yidinji Elder Gudju Gudju. We paid our deep respect to him in singing at his funeral later in the year. He had worked with Lyn Williams for years, sharing Yidinji stories and language with GICC, which have formed the basis of some of our beautiful 'On Country' videos. We were honoured to work with Gudju Gudju on *Storm Bird*, which was released in 2024, the fourth video in this series.

The choir hosted the annual Songfest Concert which took place in St Monica's Cathedral and featured a massed choir of singers from Cairns primary and secondary schools with special guest conductor Paul Holley OAM.

The Gondwana Indigenous Children's Choir worked with the ABC to film a video feature for their Classic 100 Live Concert on ABC TV.

#### 1. General information

The financial statements cover Gondwana Choirs, an entity limited by guarantee incorporated and domiciled in Australia. The entity is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards and a registered charity under the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*.

The principal activity during the year was to create and present innovative new choral work and drive collaborations that redefine how audiences perceive choirs.

Principal place of business is Wharf 4, 15 Hickson Road, Dawes Point, NSW, 2000.

The financial report was authorised for issue by the directors on 9 April 2025.

#### 2. Changes in accounting policies

#### New and revised standards that are effective for these financial statements

A number of revised standards became effective for the first time to annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2024. The adoption of these revised accounting standards has not had a material impact on the entity's financial statements.

#### Accounting Standards issued but not yet effective and not been adopted early by the entity

A number of new and revised standards have been issued but are not yet effective and have not been adopted early by the entity. The directors are currently assessing the impact such standard will have on the entity.

#### 3. Summary of material accounting policy information

#### Financial reporting framework

The general purpose financial statements of the entity have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012* and the *NSW Charitable Fundraising Act 1991*.

#### Statement of compliance

The general purpose financial statements of the entity have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Simplified Disclosures and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board.

#### **Basis of preparation**

The financial statements are presented in Australian Dollars (\$AUD), which is also the functional currency of the entity.

The material accounting policy information that has been adopted in the preparation of this report are as follows:

#### Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised on a basis that reflects the transfer of promised goods or services to customers at an amount that reflects the consideration the entity expects to receive in exchange for those goods or services.

Revenue is recognised by applying a five-step model as follows:

- 1. Identify the contract with the customer
- 2. Identify the performance obligations
- 3. Determine the transaction price
- 4. Allocate the transaction price to the performance obligations
- 5. Recognise revenue as and when control of the performance obligations is transferred

#### Income tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is exempt from income tax as a registered charity under the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*.

#### Trade and other receivables

Trade receivables are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any allowance for expected losses. Trade receivables are generally due for settlement within 30 days.

#### **Inventories**

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of inventory is determined using the first-in-first-out/weighted-average basis and is net of any rebates and discounts received. Net realisable value is estimated using the most reliable evidence available at the reporting date and inventory is written down through an obsolescence provision if necessary.

#### Property, plant and equipment

#### Depreciation

Property, plant and equipment, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the asset's useful life to the entity, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

The useful lives used for each class of depreciable assets are shown below:

#### Right-of-use assets

Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of the lease term and the estimated useful lives of the assets, as follows:

#### **Intangible assets**

#### Finite life intangibles assets

Finite life intangible assets are subsequently measured at cost less amortisation and any impairment. The method and useful lives of finite life intangible assets are reviewed annually. The following useful lives are applied:

#### Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the entity prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. Due to the short-term nature, they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

#### Liabilities relating to contracts with customers

#### **Contract liabilities**

A contract liability is recognised if a payment is received or a payment is due (whichever is earlier) from a customer before the entity transfers the related goods or services/grant conditions are fulfilled. Contract liabilities include deferred income. Contract liabilities are recognised as revenue when the entity performs under the contract (i.e., transfers control of the related goods or services to the customer/fulfils conditions of the grant).

#### Significant management judgement in applying accounting policies

When preparing the financial statements, management undertakes a number of judgements, estimates and assumptions about the recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses.

#### Estimation uncertainty

Information about estimates and assumptions that have the most significant effect on recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses is provided below. Actual results may be substantially different.

#### Receivables

The receivables at reporting date have been reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that any of the receivables are impaired. An allowance for expected losses is included, where applicable, based on historical credit loss experience, adjusted for forward-looking factors specific to the debtors and the economic environment. The allowance for expected losses is based on the best information at the reporting date.

#### <u>Inventories</u>

Management estimates the net realisable values of inventories, taking into account the most reliable evidence available at each reporting date. The future realisation of these inventories may be affected by future technology or other market-driven changes that may reduce future selling prices.

#### <u>Useful lives of depreciable assets</u>

Management reviews its estimate of the useful lives of depreciable assets at each reporting date, based on the expected utility of the assets. Uncertainties in these estimates relate to technical obsolescence that may change the utility of certain depreciable assets.

#### Long service leave

The liability for long service leave is recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.
